


Diplomacy



WOMEN MAKE HISTORY

ICC Women's World Cup comes home

ension was in the air as two teams, India Women and South Africa Women, faced off for their maiden title at Navi Mumbai's DY Patil stadium. Winning the toss, South Africa elected to field first. And despite everything, India set a target of 299 for the opposition. India's 298/7 was supported by Shafali Verma's 87 off 78 balls, along with others' powerful batting performances. Even with the ball, the girls were brilliant, with Verma taking two unexpected wickets at crucial junctures in the match, and Deepti Sharma, a world-class offspinner, taking a five-wicket haul. South African captain Laura Wolvaardt backed up the team's total with a century in the final, but her team's chase efforts crumbled in the face of regular wickets, resulting in a 52-run loss. The winning moment for India came in the 46th over, when Nadine de Klerk sliced a low full toss towards extra cover, and India captain Harmanpreet Kaur caught the ball. True sportmanship emotional was seen a Marizanne Kapp was embraced by Indian players, Jemimah Rodrigues and Radha Yadav.

YORK CITY

This was the first time South Africa had entered the finals. India, however, had two heartbreaks in 2005 and 2017, crushing the dreams of Jhulan Goswami and Mithali Raj, who laid the strong foundation for the women's team. Notably, the winners of the world champions shared the glittering trophy with two legendary trailblazers, a moment of many goosebumps.

Our women's team wrote history, winning the match with their stellar gameplay, and some part of the victory can be given to one of BCCI's unprecedented moves in 2022. During its 15th Apex Council meeting, unanimously passed a resolution to introduce pay parity between India's men's and women's cricketers. The global committee debated heavily on the revenue generated by women's sports, calling it an over-correction. Some critics, even questioned the team's losses over the years. However, the women's team proved their mettle and earned the laurels. And let's not forget Pratika Rawal, who scored 308 runs in the Women's World Cup 2025 before being replaced by Shafali Verma due to injury, received her well-deserved winners' medal as well. Gone are the days when people hardly acknowledged women's sports. Of course, no Indian can forget November 19, 2023, the final loss against Australia. But now, "For every Nov 19, there's Nov 2."



New York electing a socialist or RKK students surviving daliya and pakora

s it when a city rejects decades of capitalism and elects a socialist mayor or when a group of students endures another week of daliya and pakora from the same ever-faithful dining hall menu?

When Zohran Mamdani shook the political foundations of New York, commentators called it a "modern revolution." He stood against greed and inequality, daring to believe that every ordinary citizen deserved dignity not just those with wealth or power.

He fought for equality in wages and fairness in housing. And when he won, it wasn't just politics that changed it was as if New York itself danced to a new tune, or as Zohran might say, "Dhoom Machale." And in some distant way, RKK students fight for the same equality each of us receiving an equal share of cakes, equally unforgettable. At RKK, our battlefields are dining tables. There are no protests, just one silent prayer before every meal: "Please, let today be noodles... or aloo puri, maybe even pav bhaji." Yet, we show up with the same spirit, the same appetite for hope, and that, perhaps, is what makes us revolutionaries in our own right.





Because in the end, every revolution whether in New York or in the RKK dining hall, begins with a dream. Some dream of equality, others of extra gulab jamun. But both dreamers share one thing in common: they believe change is possible, and sometimes, that belief alone is enough to make history or at least, the menu.

So, what's the bigger revolution? Maybe both changed the world, and the other changed our taste buds forever. Because while New York questioned capitalism, RKK questioned monotony. And somehow, both won.

SANCTIONS SHAKE UP GLOBAL OIL TRADE

Russian crude faces falling demand and rising uncertainty by Aarohi Bhattacherjee XI B

Russian oil is now selling at much lower prices than before. The current discount is one of the biggest seen in a year. This change follows new sanctions introduced by Donald Trump. These sanctions don't stop the trade completely, they just make it far more difficult to carry out. Shipping inspections take longer, insurance approvals require extra proof and documentation, and banks are more careful. A deal that once took days can now take weeks. And to keep its exports moving, Russia has lowered its prices in order to remain competitive in a tense market.





India and China were major buyers of Russian crude over the last two years. Both these countries counted on these purchases to keep fuel costs manageable. Recently, however, they have reduced their orders. Their refiners are struggling to pay suppliers through international banking channels. Some payments are delayed or held back for verification. The atmosphere around the trade feels slower and more uncertain. Companies are still interested in discounted oil but they prefer to avoid appearing overly exposed to sanctions-related backlash. This situation is reshaping how energy trade routes work. With payments and shipping under stricter checks, several refiners in Asia and Europe have begun adjusting where they source oil from.

India has increased spot purchases from Iraq and the UAE to keep supplies steady. China has leaned more on its long-running contracts with Saudi Arabia. Shipping data indicates that more Russian cargoes are waiting longer near ports while banks and insurers verify documents. The market continues to function, but the flow is slower, showing how political pressure is now directly shaping commercial decisions. The coming months will likely decide whether this moment becomes a long-term shift or just a temporary slowdown. Oil is not only about supply and demand. It is also about influence, alliances, and the choices nations make when the world order begins to shift.
