## Queen Anne's School (RS Postcard Call)



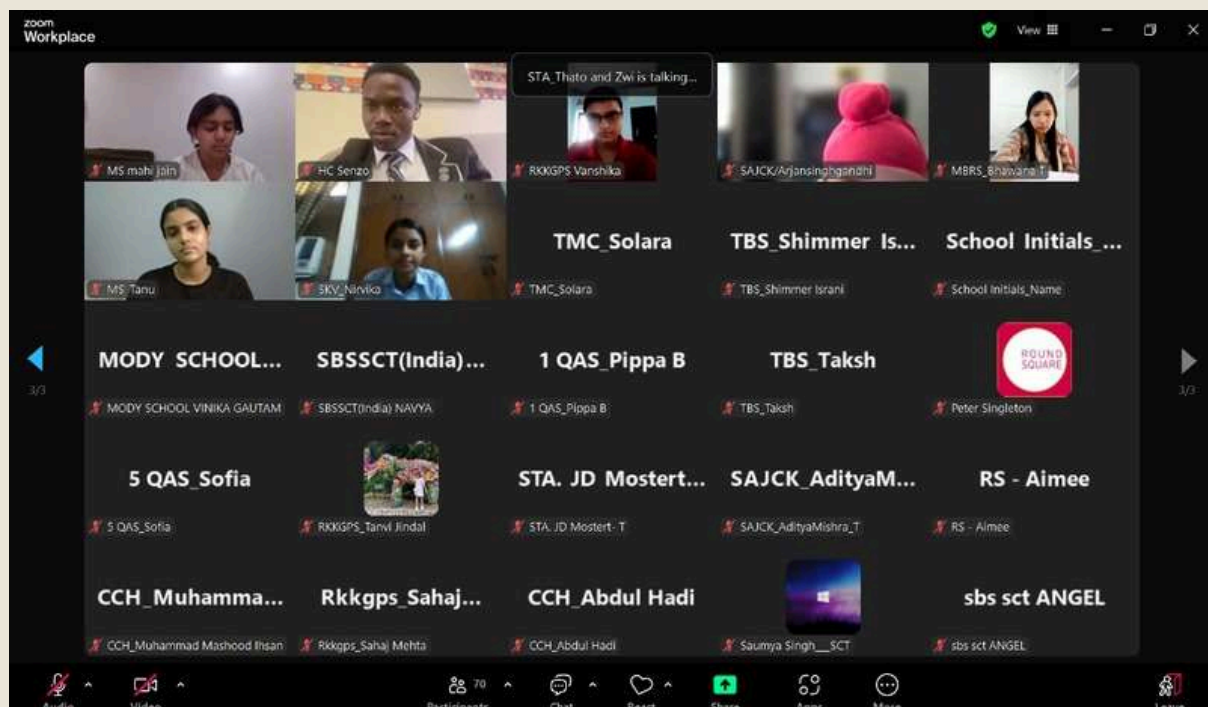

Echoing this ethos, nine students of RKK — *Aarya Mehta Dixit, Parnika Rathore, Advika Kansara, Sanghmitra Rathore, Bhuvvi Mathur, Navya Rathore, Shravya Gehlot, Veronica Singh Bhati and Kanishkkaa Vishnoi* — embarked on a meaningful service endeavour to Moran Blind School, Assam from 21st to 28th May 2025 followed by an enriching excursion to Shillong and Guwahati, under the able guidance of Mrs. Radhika Singh and Mr. Anit Borgohain. What unfolded was far more than just a travel experience — it became a profound journey of empathy, gratitude, resilience and joy. The journey began in Assam, where the group was welcomed with warmth and generosity by Moran Blind School. The students embraced the visitors not as outsiders, but as family. From morning assemblies to bhajan sessions, from shared meals to spirited games, every moment spent together left an indelible impact. Witnessing the students using Braille, navigate with white canes and soulful singing was both humbling and inspiring. Their independence, strength and joy became powerful lessons for all. The exchange blossomed into a beautiful two-way celebration of culture. RKK students sang Assamese songs, while the local students replied with songs in Marwari. Dance performances of Bihu & Jhumur, laughter-filled games, and shared meals bridged not only language barriers but also those of ability and background. Through antakshari, storytelling, and spontaneous play, hearts connected in ways that words could never fully express. Beyond the school, the journey unfolded through the cultural and historical richness of Assam. Visits to Shivadol Temple, Rang Ghar, Kareng Ghar, and the Moidams offered deep insights into the legacy of the Ahom dynasty. Touring tea estates and factories gave students a first hand look at the craftsmanship, tradition, and economy behind Assam's world-famous tea. From the aroma of tea gardens to the old-world charm of heritage clubs, every stop deepened their appreciation for the region.

Music remained a powerful thread throughout the journey. A joint performance of “Mati Re”, a soulful ode to one's motherland, became an emotional highlight — a moment of unity, pride, and shared emotion. Whether it was impromptu karaoke, birthday serenades, or folk music echoing through valleys, music connected the group in unforgettable ways. Even when the itinerary was tested by fog, delays, and long journeys, the students responded with resilience and grace. From Kaziranga National Park to Kaziranga Biodiversity Park, Mawsmai caves, Seven Sister Waterfall, and bustling Police Bazaar, every experience added a layer of learning — about nature, adaptation, and the strength of a positive attitude. Every meal, every host, and every gesture of hospitality spoke volumes. From community leaders to families in remote towns, generosity overflowed — often given with nothing expected in return. The students learned first hand that true wealth lies not in possessions, but in kindness. As the journey came to a close, emotions ran deep. What began as a school trip transformed into a life-changing experience. The students returned not just with memories, but with newfound values — of humility, gratitude, service, inclusion, and cultural understanding. This exchange was a living reminder that inclusion isn't about what someone lacks, but how fully they are welcomed. And the North-East, with all its colours, sounds, and souls, welcomed them wholly and wholeheartedly.

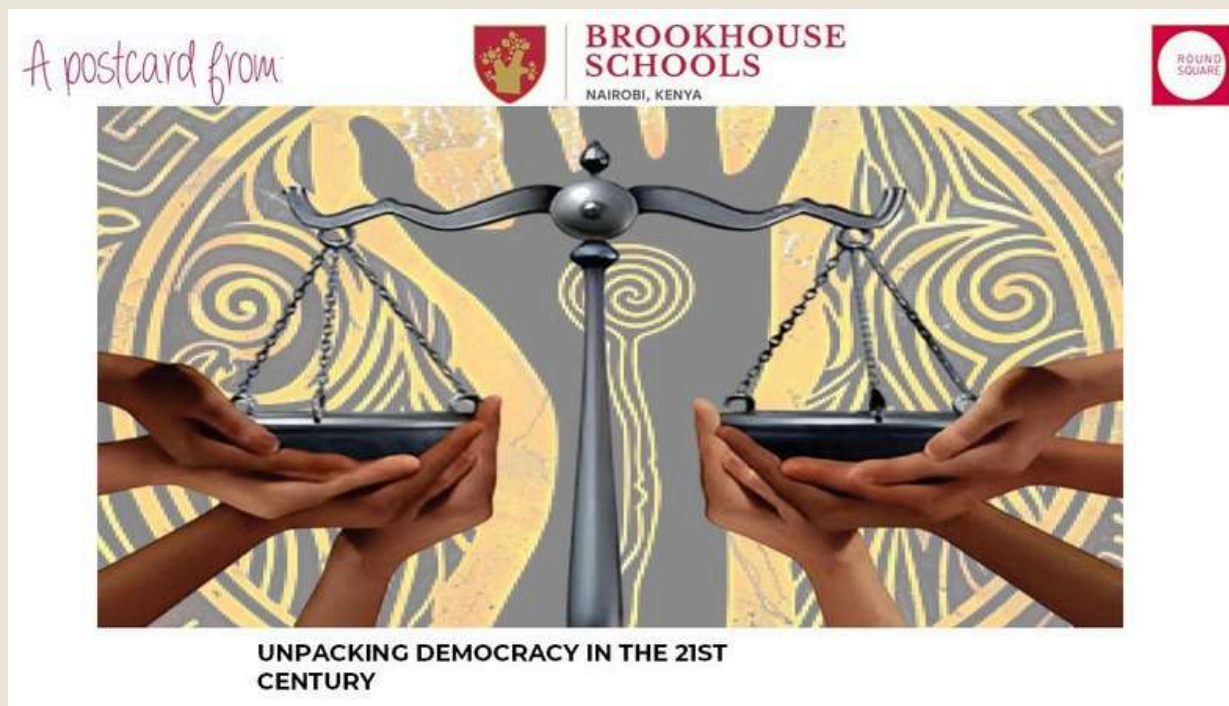

RKKians proudly presented a slide highlighting key democratic pillars such as the Legislature, Executive, Judiciary and Media, emphasizing how these ideals are embedded in the Indian Constitution and actively shape our nation. 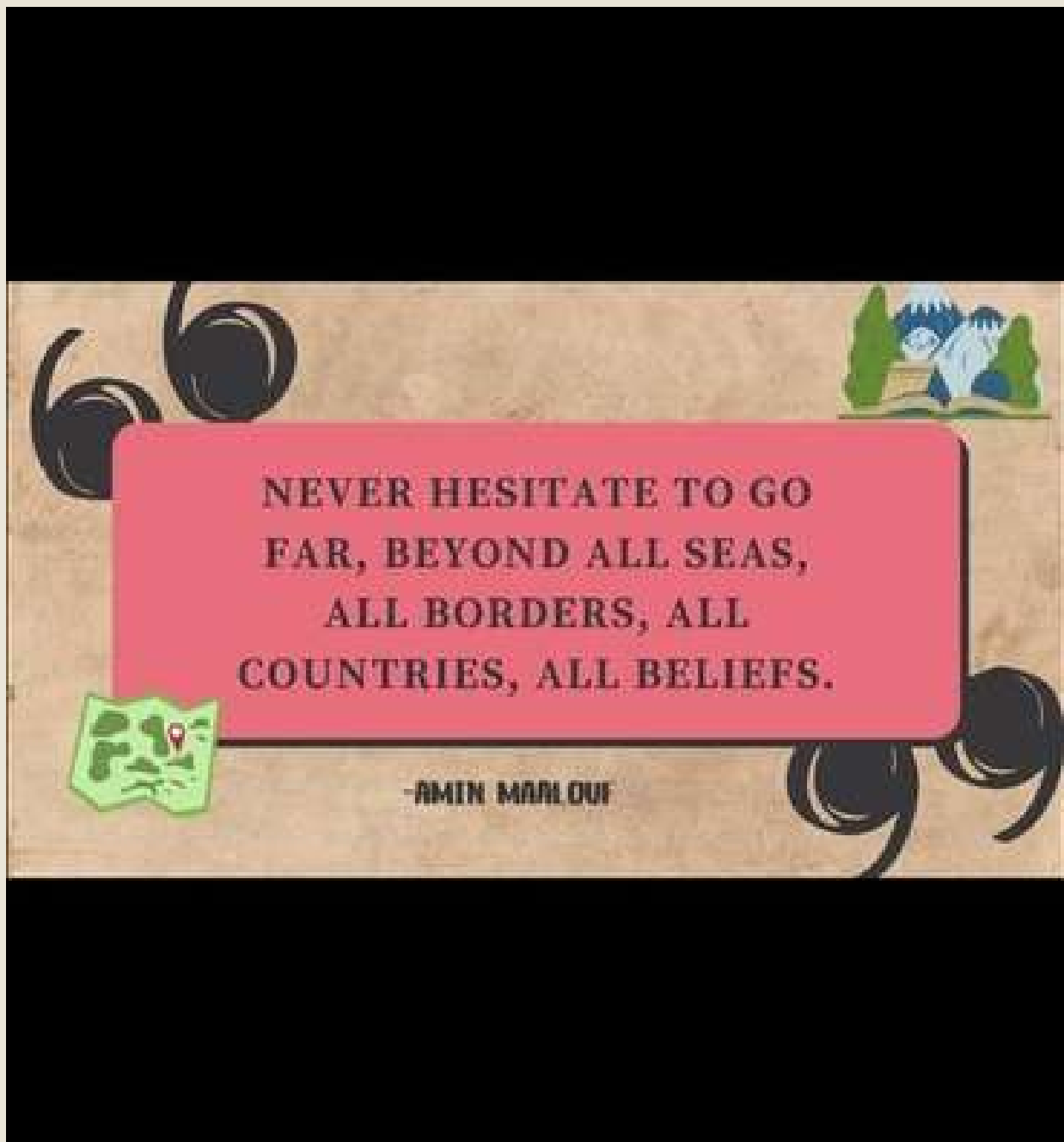

The call was all about stepping out of our comfort zones and finding our true selves.

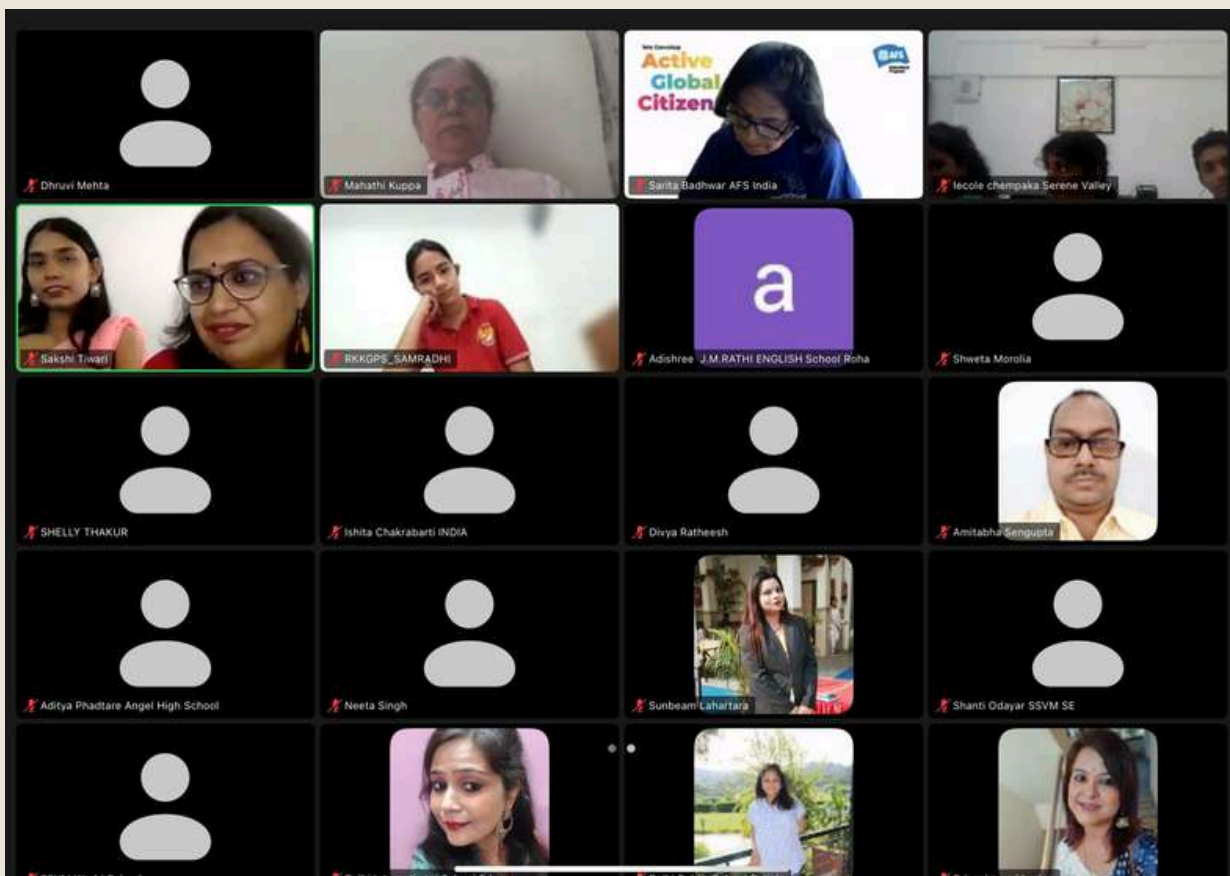

## Newcastle Grammar School (RS Zoom Postcard)



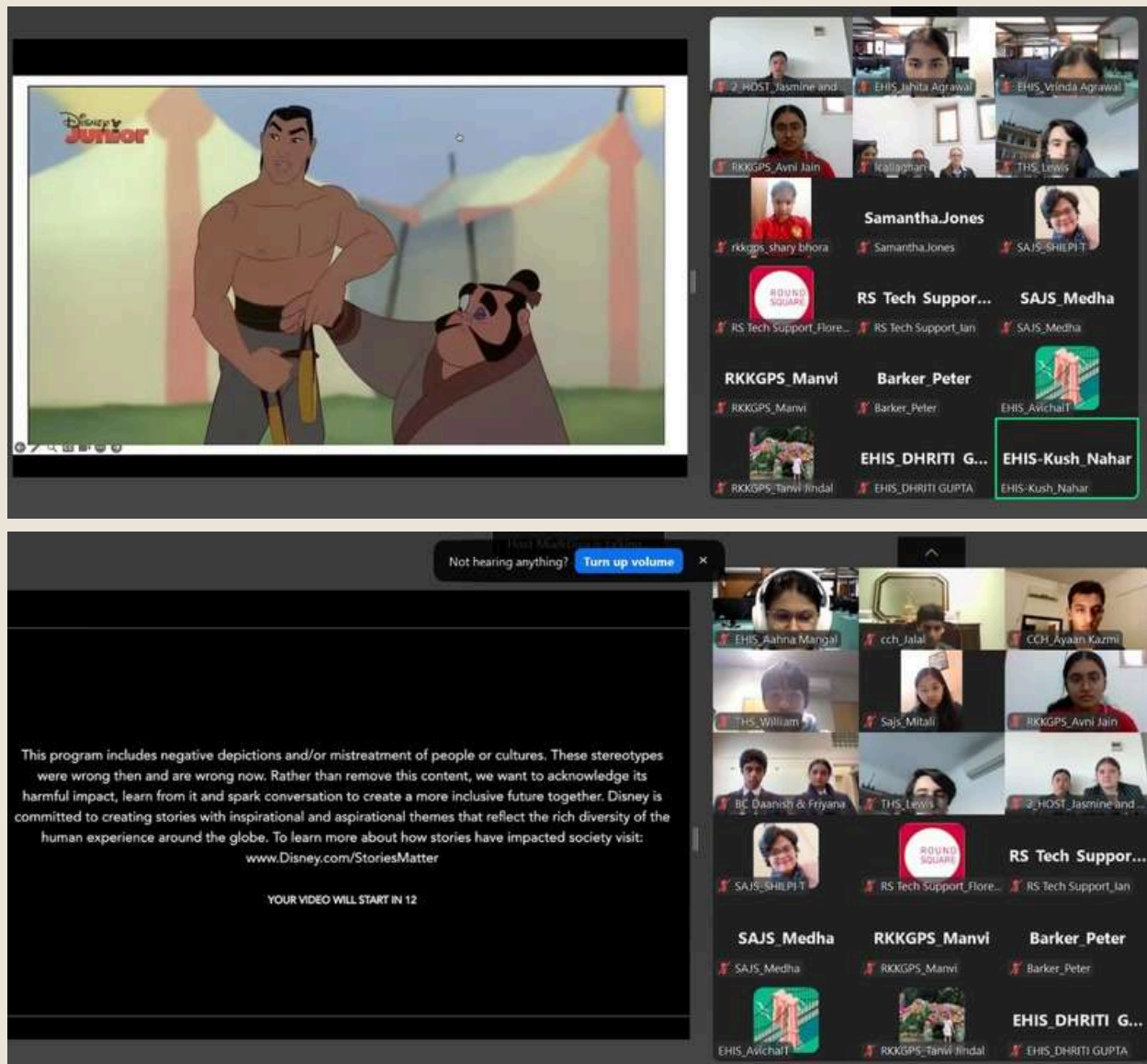

The discussion emphasized the need for a critical approach to digital content and encouraged students to take personal responsibility in representing and preserving cultural values.

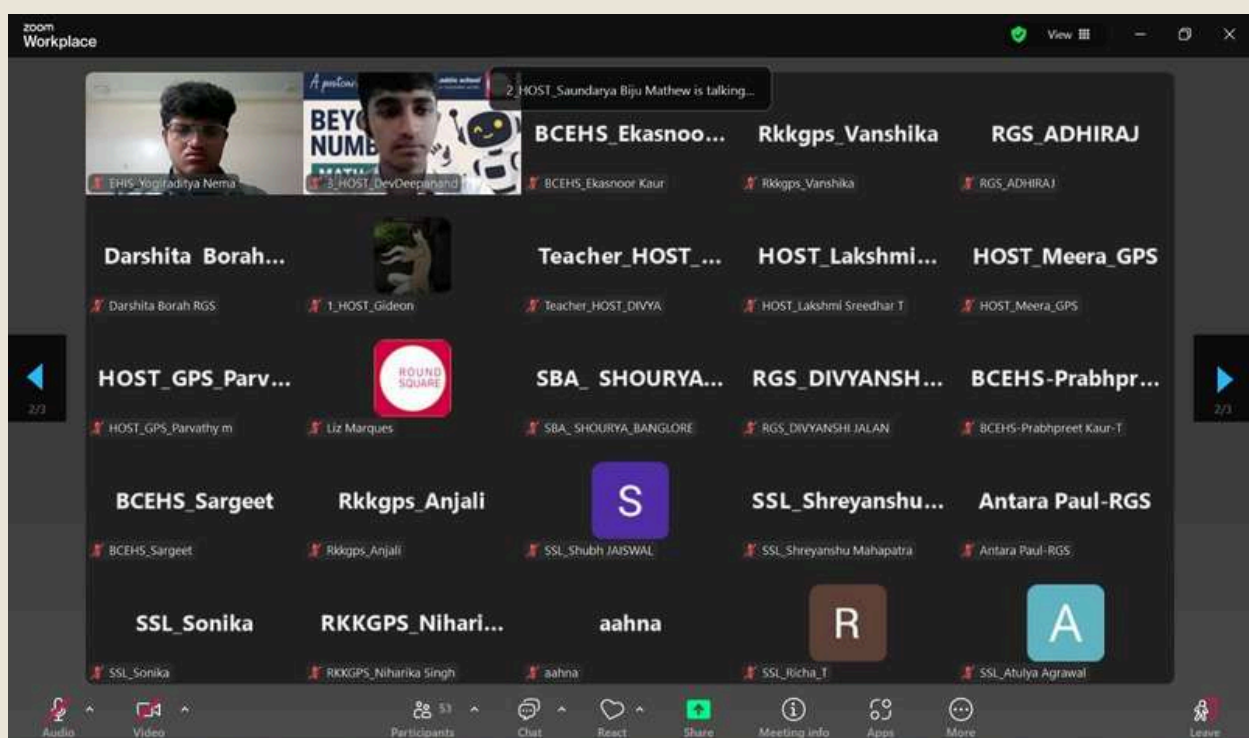




In a world quietly governed by algorithms and shaped by invisible equations, the Round Square Postcard Call hosted by Global Public School on June 18<sup>th</sup> offered a window into the fascinating union of Digits and Data, where the silent language of numbers finds voice through Artificial Intelligence. As the virtual doors opened at 6:00 PM IST, a diverse gathering of young thinkers and learners logged in from across countries and cultures, ready to explore the complex yet captivating theme: “Digits & Data: Where Numbers Meet AI.” The screen, though digital, felt alive, each participant a glowing pixel of curiosity in this collective canvas of innovation.

Representing RKK, a team of six students, Gayatri Rathore, Anjali, Niharika Singh, Shailja Soni, Vanshika Bajaj, and Samridhi Charan, guided by their ever-encouraging teacher mentor Mrs. Sapna Gupta, and student leader Adwitiya Saxena, stepped forward into this intellectual arena with confident strides. In preparation for the event, each school had been invited to create a single-slide presentation that reflected on two real-life situations where both Math and Artificial Intelligence converge seamlessly in our daily lives. With creativity and clarity, RKK's slide wove together two compelling narratives, the magic behind Spotify's suggestive Playlists that suggest the best songs before we even think to ask, and the intelligence of face recognition systems in smart phones that help to keep devices safe. During the main session, Vanshika Bajaj and Anjali eloquently presented the slide. Their words painted technology not as a cold machine, but as a thinking companion powered by numbers.

The call then branched into breakout rooms, where minds mingled in smaller circles. Here, the discussions bloomed. RKK's team spoke with thoughtfulness and openness, echoing the collaborative spirit that Round Square celebrates. The call was more than just a virtual meeting — it was a digital dance of digits and data. It offered a platform where curiosity met computation, and where the next generation of thinkers began seeing AI not as distant technology, but as a partner in their everyday life.

With this as their key takeaway, Dhruvi Mehta (XD), Manvi Gulecha (XC), and Khyati Rathi (XA) proudly represented RKK in the online TimeSnap event hosted by Miles Bronson Residential School under the flagship of AFS, held between **20th May and 21st June 2025**. The event was a creative, time-travel-themed initiative that encouraged students to explore a historical era or culture through the lens of a handcrafted scrapbook. Participants were invited to blend facts with imagination, using diary entries, visuals, and storytelling to bring history to life in a personal and meaningful way. Although the RKK team did not make it to the final round, the experience proved to be an enriching and inspiring one for them. Their scrapbook, titled “Dust of the Dynasty,” explored the fall of China’s 2000-year-old imperial rule through the eyes of a fictional journalist, Li Wenhua. Combining historical insight with narrative flair, their work featured reflective writing, original sketches, and creative cultural elements that brought the past vividly into focus. It was not just about retelling history — it was about reliving it. Throughout the process, they discovered the value of teamwork, empathy, and the art of powerful storytelling. While the competition outcome didn’t place them among the finalists, the learning, growth, and memories they gained from the journey are what truly defined their success.



On June 25, 2025, a dynamic team of eight students participated in an enlightening RS Zoom session themed "Embracing Culture." The participants included Nishika Pagaria (Team Leader), Hitanshi Jain, Tanishka Jain, Nishika Kumbhat, Sonakshi Charan, Naiza Belim, Tanusha Singh, and Arya Mehta Dixit. This session aimed to explore various aspects of culture and foster a deeper understanding among the participants enriching dialogue about culture through breakout room discussions, each focusing on different sub-topics related to the overarching theme. The call began with the introduction and an ice breaker session followed by an interactive session about various questions related to the topic like “How can we ensure that science remains unbiased in the search for truth” etc. It was an engaging and meaningful session that had left everyone participating informed and inspired. At the end, the participants learned how trust shapes our media-filled lives by influencing what we believe and who we listen to, it's essential for finding truth in a world flooded with information and misinformation.

In a powerful initiative to turn concern into commitment and emotion into action, SAI International School, Bhubaneswar, hosted a vibrant RS Zoom Postcard on July 2, 2025, centered around the compelling theme: “Eco-Anxiety and Student Activism: Harnessing Emotions for Positive Change.” This unique virtual event brought together nearly 90 participants from Round Square Schools across the globe, all united by a shared purpose—to explore the emotional impact of environmental challenges and discover how young voices can shape a greener tomorrow. Representing RKK with great enthusiasm and thoughtfulness were: Aradhya Soni, Pearl Rathi, Aarya Mehta Dixit (VII A), Yana Agarwal, Shanaya Tak (VII B), Aarna Mishra (VII D) and Student Leader - Priyal Jain (XI D), accompanied by their adult delegate. Their participation reflected not only their concern for the planet but also their readiness to lead with empathy and awareness.

The session began with warm introductions and energizing ice-breakers that set the stage for meaningful interactions. As a pre-task, each school had submitted a creative five-slide collage or photo album representing their interpretation of eco-anxiety. These visual expressions captured the depth of young people's emotions—ranging from fear and frustration to hope and resilience. Engaging breakout sessions followed, offering a safe space for students to share personal reflections, exchange ideas, and spotlight student-led initiatives that have made a real difference in their communities. The conversations revealed a common thread: while eco-anxiety is deeply felt, it can also be deeply transformative when paired with action, awareness, and unity. The event concluded with joyful interactive games and brainstorming activities that ignited collaboration and innovation. It was a celebration of student agency—a reminder that the future belongs to those brave enough to imagine it differently. This enriching experience empowered students to see themselves not as passive observers of the environmental crisis, but as proactive changemakers—capable of converting anxiety into advocacy and emotion into empowerment.



St. George's College, Peru, hosted a Round Square Zoom Postcard on the theme "Preserving our Cultural Heritage" on 2nd July 2025, bringing together 60 participants from 11 schools across five countries—Germany, India, Pakistan, Peru, and South Africa. RKK's delegation comprised seven enthusiastic students—Geet Bhansali, Aleena Khan, Manasvi Bhandari, Manvi Gulecha, Kulgaurvi Chouhan, Khyati Rathi, and Saniksha Chouhan—led by their Student Leader, Niharika Champawat.

The host school opened the session with a powerful presentation highlighting Peru's rich cultural legacy, from Indigenous crafts and sacred sites to ongoing efforts in heritage documentation. As a part of the core activity, each school submitted a Digital Poster capturing their nation's initiatives to protect cultural traditions. RKK's entry was a colorful and thoughtful portrayal of India's living heritage—featuring elements such as Traditional Textiles, Classical Performing Arts and Community Projects focused on conserving Regional Architecture and Oral Histories.

In the Barazza breakout rooms, students engaged in fascinating cross-cultural discussions. RKK's representatives shared how festivals, craft collectives, and educational outreach are being used to revive interest in endangered folk practices across India. The collaborative spirit within the groups fostered a broader understanding of the diverse approaches to cultural preservation taken by each participating country.

The event drew to a close with a captivating video presentation of traditional Peruvian dance. Students were enthralled by performances of the Marinera, a graceful and romantic courtship dance, and the Danza de las Tijeras (Scissors Dance), known for its rhythmic precision and acrobatic intensity. The visual spectacle left a lasting impression and underscored the universal power of art in cultural storytelling.

A final Q&A wrapped up the session, leaving participants with a deeper appreciation of their own heritage and the shared values that bind cultures worldwide. For RKK's team, the RS Zoom Postcard was a rich cultural immersion and a reaffirmation of their role as young ambassadors of tradition and identity.
