


## Melbourne Global Centre, Delhi (Two-day STEM Workshop in collaboration with NPSC)

Two-day STEM Workshop hosted by Melbourne Global Centre and Ramjas International School, Delhi, on 12-13 November 2025 was attended by Mrs Suman Rathore and Dr Shrestha Singhal. It began with an introduction to STEM education and its importance in preparing students for future careers. The resource person, Emily Rochetta, and Prof. Jan Van Driel explained how modern technologies ignite the STEM experience in children.

The resource person emphasized and explained the benefits of interdisciplinary understanding of a particular topic, bringing together concepts, methods, or forms of communication from two or more disciplines or established areas of expertise to explain the phenomenon, solve the problem, or create a product. STEM education focuses on real-world problems relevant to students, emphasizing 21st-century skills, employment, and the application of collaborative and active pedagogies. They participated in a hands-on activity to design small structures using an OZOBOTS and learnt how to connect Science, Social science, Mathematics, and technology to develop a better STEM experience. Participants worked in teams to create a mini-project demonstrating the role of technology in solving a real-world problem. One group prepared a bot that can test the presence of various nutrients in food products. The second day began with two real-life problems: The Granny's on the move, and Is my plant thirsty?

Teachers were divided into groups, and there was a brainstorming discussion on both the problems. Each group concluded with the best possible outcomes. Later, participants were given a chance to present their school's project relevant to SDGs. RKK's faculty presented Project PRAYAAS under SDG-3, good health and well-being, which was appreciated and included in the presentation by the resource person. The visit to ATL labs and experiencing the hands-on activity and robots prepared by students was a wonderful experience. The interaction with students and the exchange of ideas with fellow school teachers was a brilliant networking. The two-day STEM workshop was an enriching experience that deepened the understanding of how technology is revolutionizing Mathematics, Science, Engineering and overall technological development. The activities improved analytical thinking, creativity and collaboration skills of all the participants. This workshop strengthened everyone's interest in STEM and motivated all to explore future opportunities in technologically driven fields.

Participants were then divided into five themed breakout rooms, each led by RKK students and enriched with presentations, activities, videos, quizzes, and interactive elements:



## National Constitution Day Celebration

On 26th November 2025, Rajmata Krishna Kumari Girls' Public School, Jodhpur celebrated National Constitution Day (Samvidhan Divas) with great enthusiasm and patriotic fervor to commemorate the adoption of the Constitution of India on 26th November 1949. Highlights of the Programme

### 1. Keynote Address

The programme commenced with an insightful and inspiring keynote speech delivered by Mrs. Seema Baxi Malhotra, Dean Academics (Senior Wing). Ma'am eloquently explained the historical background of the making of the Constitution, the visionary role played by Dr. B.R. Ambedkar and other members of the Constituent Assembly, and the importance of constitutional values such as Justice, Liberty, Equality and Fraternity in today's times. Her address left the audience deeply motivated to uphold and protect the ideals of the Constitution.

### 2. Preamble Pledge

Students solemnly read the Preamble to the Constitution of India in unison. The collective recitation in both English and Hindi created an atmosphere of unity and reinforced the commitment of every individual present to the Sovereign, Socialist, Secular, Democratic Republic of India.

### 3. Quiz on the Indian Constitution

## DEVELOPMENT OR DESTRUCTION?

Is the destruction of environment a new definition of Development by the judicial system?

In 1987 the UN-sponsored World Commission on Environment and Development issued the Brundtland Report which introduced the concept of Sustainable Development—which means development that meets the needs of the present without compromising needs of future generation. Our country plans to achieve sustainability by 2030 but is this possible when we focus on short term profits rather than seeing ahead of time? Recent verdict of Hon'able Supreme Court of India has stated that Aravalli ranges under the range of 100m won't be considered as Aravalli and has stated this act as means of development and is done to fit Aravalli under a periphery of a scientific definition. How can destruction of the oldest mountain range – Aravalli be a means for development? Is need of a scientific definition worth the destruction by 90 of the oldest mountain range?

Without the Aravalli acting as a barrier, the Thar Desert could expand eastward into fertile Indo-Gangetic plains, threatening agriculture in Haryana, western Uttar Pradesh, and NCR.

•Loss of rocky terrain and forest cover would reduce rainwater percolation, worsening aquifer recharge. NCR, already water-stressed, could face acute shortages.

•The range slows hot desert winds and redirects monsoon currents. Its destruction could raise summer temperatures by 2–3°C and reduce rainfall distribution across northern India.

•Over 300 bird species, leopards, jackals, and other wildlife depend on the Aravalli Habitat loss would fragment ecosystems and accelerate species decline.

•The Aravalli acts as “green lungs” for Delhi-NCR. Delhi already suffers from Air Pollution to the extent that oxygen parlours have been established there. Their removal would intensify dust storms and pollution, worsening already hazardous air quality.

•Aravalli's loss would reduce natural absorption of rainwater, increasing flash floods, soil erosion, and land degradation.

•The SC's 100-meter height rule strips protection from 90% of the hills, opening vast areas to mining and real estate projects, leading to irreversible ecological damage.

•As one of the world's oldest mountain ranges (over 650 km long), destruction of the Aravalli erases a unique geological heritage.

So ask yourself, is this the 'development' we want for India by 2030?

The topic for the call was 'what are the greatest Challenges faced in making Cities More Sustainable and which Stratigies have Proven Most Successful'.


It covered areas like waste management, energy efficiency, and transport and reflected on questions like how can local government, businesses, and residents contribute to creating a more sustainable urban environment.

## Inventure Academy in India (RS Zoom Postcard)





The session culminated in a lively and animated Question & Answer round, where students from across countries engaged with Ramen on topics ranging from creative writing and publishing to overcoming fear and finding one’s voice.
